JUNE 2021 Sunday Mass Readings

To prepare for Mass, read the Gospel before you attend. Following Mass, discuss the question posted below with your family.

June 6th – What does it mean for you that the bread and wine becomes Jesus' Body and Blood during the liturgy of the Eucharist? What feelings or ideas does it surface?

June 13th – "The kingdom is always present because the Father himself has brought it into the world through the passion, death and resurrection of His Son, Jesus Christ. From the day of the Pentecost, the Holy Spirit never ceases to communicate the power of Christ's kingship, and to invite men and women to find salvation in the one who is the way, and the truth, and the life"— Pope John Paul II." How would you explain the Kingdom of God to someone who asks about it?

June 20th – In the gospel Jesus calms the sea and wind, telling them, "Quiet! Be Still!" What storms in your life are you being called to entrust to the Lord?

June 27th - What are some of the miraculous moments in your own life? Do you ever pray for miracles?
